# No-con vote on the way

With the Nitijela currently on recess awaiting the call of Speaker Donald Capelle, no confidence motion rumors abound.

But, said opposition KEA Party Chairman Jaluit Senator Alvin Jacklick, the issue will no longer be a rumor once the Nitijela comes back to session, possibly as early as next

"Our group voted unanimously to introduce the motion for a vote of no confidence when Nitijela reconvenes next week," Jacklick said Wednesday.

There has been talk since last year from opposition senators about the possibility of introducing a motion of no confidence even though the senators doing the talking acknowledged at the time they didn't have the 17 votes needed for a successful vote of no confidence.

In the wake of the Pacific Islands Forum, the "vote" talk has ramped

to giving President Loeak and his group a majority to form the government in January 2012, following the November national election the previous year.

Note did not gain a position in the new government, while the four others in his group are highly placed in the Loeak administration. According to opposition members, if Note were to support their side — which reportedly can put together about 12 senators — the deal would require his return to be president of RMI. Note was president from 2000 to 2008.

President Loeak, and Ministers Tony deBrum and Phillip Muller, are expected to return to Majuro this weekend.

The Nitijela could resume its session next week following a two-week

### Shutdown hits Majuro

The US government shutdown Tuesday, but what does this mean for the Marshall Islands? Locally, one ground-breaking event has been postponed and a US-supported loan program has temporarily halted services.

According to a Department of Interior official, Compact funds



### Kijiner asks Japan to reconsider ECC decision


RMI Ambassador to Japan Tom Kijiner has requested the Japanese government reconsider its decision on improvements for the ECC gymnasium in Majuro. JICA officials in Majuro said their headquarters in Tokyo has been informed of the RMI's request. As of this week, there is no further

Recently, Japan officials said their government was unable to fund the rebuilding of the gym as requested by the RMI government earlier this year.

JICA Resident Representative in Majuro Hideki Tomobe said a needs survey for RMI showed two projects for Japan's new fiscal year, which starts April 1, 2014:

- ECC gym
- Water Supply and Sewage Treatment

The second project is still under discussion, with no decision reached. The ECC is awaiting a response.



# Zori wins GIFF Audience Award

For three years running, Marshall Islands filmmakers have won awards at the Guam International Film Festival (GIFF).

This past weekend, at the third annual GIFF, the nine-minute film "Zori" won the "Audience Award" narrowly beating out a feature from the Philippines that had already won two GIFF awards.

"As a fan of short films, it's refreshing to see something like this come along — a film that fully completes itself and is straight forward and heart warming," said reviewer Misty Layne in a story on the Rogue Cinema website.

Zori is the fifth film of co-directors Jack Niedenthal and Suzanne Chutaro, but the first short story they've submitted to film festivals. It will show in mid-October at the Hawaii International Film Festival in

"On an island a flip flop is a terrible thing to lose" is the tagline on the film, and when lead actor Labro (Maxter Tarkwon) finds one of his zoris missing when he gets up one morning, he learns how true this is. Bubu (Neitha Gideon) orders Labro to find his missing zori or don't come home. Thus begins our hero's one-zori odyssey through rural Majuro searching for a matching zori.

Niedenthal and his wife Regina attended

the GIFF, and were on hand to receive the award last weekend. "The film we beat by only four votes — they said it was the closest vote ever — was 'Breakaway,' a very powerful, huge budget film from the Philippines that had already won both the Grand Jury Award for Feature Narratives and the Best Acting Award earlier in the evening and was the closing night featured film," said Niedenthal after Zori was called to acclaim. "Whew!"

"Maxter Tarkwon does an excellent job in portraying Labro," said Layne in her recent review of the film." As all the actors in this are from the Bikinian and Majuro Atoll communities, I'm assuming Maxter hasn't had a lot of acting experience before which makes his performance that much more charming. Bright eyed and with a killer smile, you'll fall in love with Labro long before his journey is over."

With Zori winning the Audience Award, Niedenthal and Chutaro have three awards in as many years that the Guam festival has been in existence. Laninbwil's Gift won the Grand Jury award at the inaugural GIFF in 2011 and Ainikien Jidjid ilo Bon (Sound of Crickets at Night) won Best Actor award at the 2012 GIFF for the efforts of youthful lead actress Salome Fakatou.
